## Can you help us make T-shirts?

Can you help DSA produce t-shirt transfer shirts for the DSA camp store, and for the auction winners of the shirt that says "My dog scout and I can earn 30 merit badges before breakfast... What can you do?"

#### The job would involve:

- 1. Procuring shirts (I get them at a local shop that prints t-shirts, or order them online through Amazon)
- 2, Procuring t-shirt transfers (a reliable kind that makes work easy)
- 3. Having access to a t-shirt transfer press, or owning an iron, tin foil, and a Teflon sheet, to facilitate ironing them on by hand
- 4. Printing the transfers with a high-quality photo print setting, and making sure there are no stray black ink marks on the edges
- 5. Ironing on the transfers so that they are centered onto the shirt (Lonnie can give additional instructions, if needed)
- 6. Mailing the shirts out priority mail flat rate envelope to the recipient of the auction item
- 7. Mailing or delivering batches of shirts for the camp store to the Michigan camp
- 8. Sending supplies receipts to DSA for reimbursement

Anyone can volunteer for this unpaid position; if you've not done T-shirt transfers before, you'll need to know there are some fumes given off by the melting transfer material and of course you'll have to be careful working with hot surfaces.

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## Member Reminders for the New Year

Did you know that your Troop Leader is expected to send in a Troop Report at the end of each year as part of the Troop Recognition Program? Perhaps your troop can earn more points and recognition for the services and activities you're participating in as a DSA representative.

## Here's a review of the activities you can report to your troop leader

- ⇒ If your dog gets a Dog Scout title or any badges during the year (or a pack dog title)
- ⇒ If the troop has helped you make significant training progress with an issue your dog has/had
- ⇒ Any troop activity in which troop members are helping to raise funds for a non-profit should have (at minimum): what the activity was/charity that benefits, the date it occurred, hours each person participated, and how much (total) was raised. Note also the amount that goes to DSA (if any).
- ⇒ Booth Events: Need date, activity, and number of hours each troop member helped in the booth.
- ⇒ If you offer free instruction at a training seminar (or class) that is dog related and uses positive training techniques, need: date, seminar title/subject, # of hours you instructed. Your session needs to be offered free of charge as a community service.
- ⇒ If you share knowledge with your fellow troop members that you gained from a seminar, DVD, or other dog training source make sure it is noted on the record keeping form. You can share in person at a scheduled time, at a meeting or through a detailed email
- ⇒ If you attend a DSA camp or mini-camp or the Leadership retreat
- ⇒ Community Service WITH your dog, need: Date, activity and the names of all DSA members that participated (& especially how many hours each worked.) To qualify, you need to be acting as a representative of DSA or the troop, or be wearing DSA logo shirt or hat and/or at some point talk to someone there about DSA or the troop.
- ⇒ Community service without your dog, need: Date, activity and the names of all DSA members that participated (& especially how many hours each worked.) To qualify, you need to be acting as a representative of DSA or the troop, or be wearing DSA logo shirt or hat and/or at some point talk to someone there about DSA or the troop.
- ⇒ Clean-up of dog waste that has been abandoned in public and would not otherwise be cleaned up: Need: # of piles you picked up and disposed of properly. If you are working on the Clean-up America badge, you'll need photo proof of the piles you clean up (photos of bags.)

Perhaps you can e-mail your updates to your Troop Leader after the activity/event is completed or at the end of each month, then it won't be a chore at the end of the year trying to remember all the great things you've accomplished. Many of the above activities make great updates to post on your Troop's website and/or Facebook page and for sharing in future newsletters.

## Membership Renewal Clarification

When a lapsed membership is renewed, the payment applies to 1 year from the original expiration date. In turn, if a member renews early, their dues still do not expire until a year after the original expiration date.

**Special consideration for our members on active service:** If you're duties preclude your participation in local Troop activities, please e-mail <a href="mailto:membership@dogscouts.org">membership@dogscouts.org</a> and request a freeze on your membership until you notify us of your safe return home or you may request a transfer of your membership to your dog's temporary guardian (provide their name and e-mail address so we can update our database and notify your Troop Leader to extend an invitation to troop activities).

## Troop Administration Update

## Regional Coordinators

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## Feet on The Ground

#### Feet on the ground

For all terrestrial animals, essential information about their environment is transmitted by their feet. Think of your own experiences... Did you like to go barefoot when you were a kid? Remember the feeling of lush green lawn underfoot, of hot sidewalk, of ouchy pebbles, or a trail in the woods? Your feet told your brain the texture, temperature and firmness of the ground beneath you in an instant. Now think of wearing unfamiliar shoes, maybe even high heels if you are unaccustomed to them. What if you want to dance, or run for your life? How confident would you be? Now imagine having a pebble in your shoe. All you can think about is how quickly can you sit down, take that shoe off and get rid of it.

#### **Ground surface**

Our brains, and those of our highly intelligent companion animals, are hard wired to interpret critical information through the soles of our feet, and the sensory nerves in our leg joints, tendons and muscles. They tell us where the ground is, how hard is it, and whether it supports our bodies. One of the mechanisms we use is a skin surface "map" on the bottom of our feet (or paws) that registers body weight and sudden changes in weight bearing. For instance, if your dog is running in a field and puts a foot into a hole, perceiving changes in the angle of the leg and pressure on the foot will trigger a fast withdrawal of that leg and shift of body weight, preventing a serious accident.

Unfortunately, our modern, man-made environments tend to alter the sensitivity of this feedback

loop. Our dogs spend much of their time on slippery floors, abrasive concrete or pile carpet-- all pretty unnatural surfaces! But dogs, as domestic animals, are highly adaptable. Most dogs with an intact nervous system can program a neural response to deal with these environmental changes.

But when a dog has neurologic challenges--like advanced age, hind end weakness, spinal disease-- we have to carefully consider whether the information they are getting from their feet is helping or hindering their locomotion. Even in a healthy dog, the "domesticated lifestyle" -- artificial surfaces and limited exercise-- can interfere with their foot-brain connection.

#### When did you last get a pedicure?

One of the most common foot issues among canine companions is long toe nails. In wild canids, miles traveled daily over rough surfaces to "make a living" result in appropriately short nails. What is an appropriately short nail? One that does not touch the ground when standing on a firm level surface, but will give useful traction when climbing a hill or digging. (See Figure 1: Normal foot) So the only time a normal dog's nail should contact the ground is when it is climbing a hill. In a dog with overgrown nails, the neurologic signal from a long toenail contacting the ground is interpreted by the brain as an inclined ground surface. (See Figure 2, long nail, abnormal posture) This abnormal compensatory posture results in too much weight carried by the hind legs, thus overloading those joints. Many animals who seem to be lame or weak behind can be helped enormously with just an effective nail trim that changes this posture.

Show dogs are groomed and clipped regularly for aesthetic reasons, but reap enormous musculoskeletal benefits from this beauty regime.

The average pet dog gets its nails clipped a couple of times a year, if it is lucky! Several factors conspire to make nail cutting a dreaded activity. With such infrequency, the dog may not be inclined to cooperate, making nail clipping into a wrestling match. The constant painful stimulus from the long toe nails hitting the ground sensitizes the nail bed, making it very uncomfortable for the dog to have its feet handled. Indeed, when the toes are pushed up or twisted by long nails, the toe joints can become arthritic and painful as well.

#### How to clip with confidence

We don't often appreciate how much dog toenails are like our own! If you look at your fingertip, you

will see the hard, insensitive nail laid on top of the living finger. If, for instance, you filed the top of the "living" portion, it would not hurt, because there is a layer of keratin-- a hard, horn like substance-- that protects the nail bed. A dog's nails are actually pretty similar. The tip of their finger is "the quick", which has sensitive nerves and blood vessels. When you "guick" a dog, making it bleed, you have essentially nipped off the end of their finger. No wonder they don't like it! But no dog ever died from a guicked toenail, so it is not the end of the world. With good technique, you can shorten even ghastly long toenails without ever making them bleed.

When toenail length is excessive, the quick grows longer, protected by the long nail. (See Figure 3, abnormal foot) The goal of therapeutic podiatry is to remove the protective long nail so that the quick

will recede. The easiest way to do this is to use **shallow** cuts with a sharp, small, scissor type nail clipper, cutting away the top of the nail. The cuts should be parallel to the quick, not across it. Whether the nail is dark or light, it is easy to distinguish between the insensitive nail and the sensitive finger tip. There is a white and chalky line around the quick-- even easier to see on a dark nail than on a white one.




Figure 5: View of dark nails - chalky insensitive nail, dark, shiny quick

(Figures 4 & 5) The quick is shiny and moist-- it looks like living tissue. In most dogs, there is a clear demarcation between them. It is possible to significantly shorten the toenails, and get an immediate postural response in a sin-

shorten the quick, one must cut once a week. Some dogs tolerate a rotary grinder, like Pedi-Paws, Oster Gentle Paws, or a dremel better than clippers.

Without the interference of erroneous information from toenails, a dog can fully rely upon its feet on the ground to stand straight and move with confidence.



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




Be sure to do your foundation work and get your dog used to foot handling. Be sure when you handle the foot you don't twist the carpus/hock joints (equivalent to the wrist/ankle). If you squeeze the foot, the dog's automatic response is to pull away, so hold firmly but don't squeeze.

Start with dog lying on his back or side (it's easier to clip with a view of the underside of the nail. Hold the dog's foot gently in one hand, the nail clippers in the other. Using the hand with the clipper, touch your dog's nails, mark and reward. Always practice with clippers in hand so your dog doesn't associate them just with nail clipping. Progress to squeezing the nail then mark and reward.



If you're not sure where the quick is, gently push your nail into the center the quick will be softer and give slightly.







Once you've placed your nail cutters in the right place – just above the soft fleshy part of the underside of the nail, angle the top back slightly towards the dog's foot before you cut; this will expose more of the quick and encourage it to recede.









Now angle your nail cutter to trim the 2 hard corners that remain on either side of your first cut. Again, angle the nail cutters back towards the dog's foot to expose more of the quick and encourage it to recede.



Or you can use a nail file (either metal or one for acrylic nails) to smooth any sharp edges.



Don't forget the dewclaws if your dog has them.





If your dog moves and you cut the quick, don't make a fuss (the more fuss you make, your dog will think it must be a big deal!). Take a pinch of styptic powder and press it onto the nail. Then move on to clipping or handling another nail, mark and reward.

## DSA Pack Dog & Trail Dog ~ Required Items

The questions we get most often are "My dog is too small to carry all of that" and "How do I fit all of that in my small dog's pack?" Here are some suggestions for all dogs to keep their packs light and keep hiking fun.

#### **Required Survival Items:**


- Flashlight a mini light will meet this requirement
- First Aid Kit a few Band-Aids or vet wrap is light weight and small for tiny dogs. Carry the full kit in your own pack.
- △ Matches 2/3 matches will work. You can get a 3-in-1 whistle/compass/matches
- ID (Identification) a business card with your ID or a dog tag with your ID attached to the pack, not their collar.
- Compass can be "mini" or "button".
- Knife Moose (pictured above) carries a tiny box cutter from a key chain in her pack.
- Signaling Device A whistle!

#### Required Items for the Dog:

- Water & Bowl A silicone cupcake dish makes a good lightweight bowl.
- Spare Leash & Collar A slip leash will cover this requirement
- <sup>⋄</sup> 3 poop bags

## Reggie Stone, Troop 239 (and 157) 4/7/2007 - 12/13/18

You read these words frequently but until you have to write them, you really can't understand their depth... This is without a doubt one of the hardest pieces I have ever had to write. Sir Reginald of Stoneybrooke, aka Reggie, crossed the Rainbow Bridge on December 23, 2018 at the age of 11 years and 8 months. Reggie was our miracle dog, as in we were amazed at the number of times he fought his way back. When we got him as a puppy he came with a severe case of kennel cough that required living in a treatment tent for 8 hours a day for a week. He decided to escape from his dad at the tender age of 1 and was run over by a car. The vet was amazed that he came out of this with only some road rash on his inner leg. At the age of 3 he developed pancreatitis, which became chronic. He lost over half his body weight in less than 2 months. It took him almost a year to gain weight to an acceptable level as the chronic pancreatitis left him with an essentially non-producing pancreas; hence man made enzymes had to be added to his meals every day until his death. At age 5 he was attacked in the face by another dog. At age 10 he developed MVD and at age 11.5 he had to have emergency surgery from an aggressive bacteria that

attacked his eye. Literally one month after the surgery he was diagnosed with an aggressive lymphoma and 2 months after his diagnosis we had to say good-bye. In spite of all this Reggie had an overwhelming love for life and people. Dogs he could really care less about, but people...he loved to be with and doing activities with people. After recovering his weight from the pancreatitis he went on to become titled excellent in Agility and only stopped there because of his MVD diagnosis. He also titled in Rally and was an animal actor, working both in commercial video and print ads. He loved working on all his badges but he took his love for the Art of Shaping to the next level, working with his sister and brother to raise money for various shelters and rescues with his painting. His next favorite badges were the Backpacking and Hiking...and any badge that let him use those skills. Everyone who knew Reggie said the same thing, 'he was such a happy boy, always smiling'. And he was just that—a happy boy. Heaven has gained a smiling angel. His family is still struggling with his loss.

Even though he became a member of Troop 239 in Louisiana, we still wanted to celebrate his life here in South Florida. Reggie was one of the original members of Troop 157 when it formed in 2009. Reggie was many wonderful things, but his smiling face at our safety presentations, and happily painting for the kids, is a memory we will never forget. He is met on the other side of the Rainbow Bridge by fellow troop members Lola, Bryant, Buddy, Champ, Homer & Brad, amongst others. We have lost a piece of our heart

Riley was adopted on August 8, 2008. We quickly found out that he loved to splash. While attending a doggy water park, we saw someone wearing a dog scout shirt. As we were Girl Scouts, we asked where to get the shirt. That's when we found out it was a real organization. We quickly joined Troop 157, Paw Patrol.

Riley loved other dogs, however he was very shy around people. With guidance and support from troop leaders and members, Riley came out of his shell. He earned the Dog Scout badge as well as the Art of Shaping. He completed activities for many other badges as well.

Riley participated in many community events, such as booths at dog events and dining out with troop members at many of the local restaurants with patios.

Riley enjoyed the troop camping trip and several kayak trips. Troop activities

taught us how to safely travel, as Riley went on trips to Orlando, St. Augustine, Pensacola, Washington, D.C., Baton Rouge, and New Orleans, as well as many excursions around south Florida.

The tumors were in his throat, thus impacting his ability to breathe. This happened quite suddenly, so we had to quickly make the decision to help Riley cross the bridge on January 5, 2019.




Ida Claire, loved by Beth Head, left us before her first birthday.




