Badge Bulletin & Title Tales It's Not That Hard

... to record your requirements for video badge submissions!

I was fearful too, at first. But I was motivated by a badge submission contest about 10 years ago. I was forced to face my fears and tackle the task. I submitted several badges by video, and actually won one of the prizes for most video badges achieved.

Here's how:

First, I looked at the parameters for the badge. Many of the bullet points on the check off sheet are training steps to help you reach your badge requirements. The things that you actually must show to your evaluator are in **bold print**, to let you know that these steps are required for the badge.

If the requirements have anything requiring a distance, like "dog must go out X feet," "Platforms will be placed 25' apart." Or "dog must catch frisbee farther than 10 yards out," then you should mark the distance, and show the distance with a measuring tape on the ground in the beginning of the video. Once you have measured and marked the distance with a cone, flag, tape on the floor, or other landmark, you can get the tape measure out of the way, and begin filming your dog doing the badge requirements.

Much of what you record will be a wide shot of you and the dog performing something together. For this, an assistant would be handy. However, if you live alone, like I do, not having someone else to video your stuff should not stop you. There are several devices you can use to put your camcorder or phone in a strategic location to film your activity.

Of course a camcorder can be affixed to a tripod easily. Ever since smart phones, though, I have filmed most of my video with my phone camera. There are different ways you can prop up your smart phone to get good video. My smart phone has a finger "ring" that folds out in the back and can be used to prop up the phone. If you need a little lower of an angle, you can prop up the kick stand on a book or something. In the first 2 photos, I used a floating key fob.





They also make special phone videoing tripods. They can be adjusted for the angle you want. There is a spring mechanism that holds your phone. You would still need to hit the video button,

and then walk on scene to get into the picture. I always set it up and notice what is the furthermost thing in the shot to the right, left, up and down. Then, just be sure that you place yourself or your subject(s) within the space you're filming. You may have to move the camera phone further away to get everything you need for the shot. You may also have to place it on the very edge of something. so you are not filming the table or golf cart seat (on which your phone sits) in your shot.

Recording your requirements for video badge submission (cont.)

If the requirement is that you show your dog performing a behavior twice, then just film it another time, or keep the video rolling and perform the behavior a second time. If you end up with more video than you wanted, don't worry, you can always edit it within your phone's video editing feature, or you can download an app that will enable you to do it. To get the footage off your smart phone, you can e-mail it to yourself, or save it to one of many cloud storage services. You could also download your footage to your laptop via the USB cord, or USB/micro-USB (Android) or Lightening connector (iPhone).

If you have a video editing app, you can also splice several shorter videos together to submit as one recording. This is especially helpful if you have to show a number of behaviors to meet all badge requirements.

Many badges do not require that you record the whole thing. For any activity where it requires you to perform a sustained activity over a period of time, such as Kayaking, Travel Safety, Biking, and Hiking, you can film a brief segment of the total time spent on the road, trail or in the water. All we need is enough to show that:

- Open proper safety measures were observed
- dithe dog did not come unglued in the presence of distractions, such as wildlife

Use your check-off sheet to make sure that you have filmed all of the required (**bolded**) elements of the badge.

Now that you have the video you need to show that you and your dog have met the requirements for the badge, what do you do with it? The days of needing to mail DVD's or flash drives are behind us, now that there is YouTube. Of course, you can still copy your video to a storage device and mail it in, but it's so much easier for you (and for the person who has to evaluate you) to just upload it to YouTube and send the link.

If you're not familiar with the process, it's very simple to get a You Tube account and start uploading videos. Instructions can be found on this link: https://www.reference.com/article/create-youtube-account-691a61501db3f971?aq=youtube+create+new+account&qo=cdpArticles YouTube is a VERY safe way to submit videos. Include the link with your badge form and any other required documentation when you send it in using the video submission process.

If anything is unclear, or the evaluator needs more information they will contact you with any questions.

We are really proud of the fact that, through the video submission process, people can submit videos and earn badges from wherever they live. If you don't belong to a troop, or don't have an assistant to help with videography, you can still earn lots of badges, long distance. If I can do this, ANYONE can. So get busy, and send us in your videos and badge forms! I'm looking forward to doing more of my own badge earning this way. I challenge you to do the same!

PRIMARY SUBMISSION METHOD

When you are ready to submit a badge form, pay for the badge using the online Badge Payment form link above. Once you receive the automatic e-mailed payment receipt, forward that receipt e-mail with the following attachments to DSAVideoEval@gmail.com:

- a) badge forms signed in person by an evaluator, **OR**
- b) forms for badges done on the "honor" system, along with the required log(s) and/or pictures, **OR**
- c) badge forms to be signed by via a video evaluation submission (remember to include your video links in the e-mail, any supporting logs and/or pictures, and be sure you have demonstrated or answered all the checklist items that were in bold/underlined font).

All badge forms and logs may either be scanned as a PDF or a clear/legible picture (jpg or png) of them taken for attachment to your e-mail.

For badge forms NOT signed by an in-person evaluator (i.e. distance/video evaluation)

Send a video link to DSAVideoEval@gmail.com: You must send your badge form, any logs and/or pictures and a copy of your online credit card payment receipt at the same time you send your video link. Your e-mail submission will then be forwarded to the appropriate Distance Evaluator who will review the video and determine if the requirements for the badge have been met. The evaluator will contact you if additional video or information is needed and will explain the reason it is needed.

Once the evaluator determines that the badge requirements have been met she will sign the form and forward it for processing. You will receive an e-mail confirming your submission has been approved. Please do not contact any Distance Evaluator directly and request that they do an evaluation for you.

If it is absolutely impossible for you to submit these forms and links electronically, follow the directions for the Alternate Submission Method found on the next page . . .

ALTERNATE SUBMISSION METHOD

Please mail the required documentation and your payment (check or money order, or a printed copy of the online payment receipt) to



Video submissions can be mailed on a CD or USB stick. Be sure to include an appropriately sized and stamped self-addressed envelope if you require your electronic media be returned.

The badge forms on the web site have been revised and include a link to this information. If you print a badge form that includes information different than what is stated above please ignore what is printed on the form and follow the process as described.

Once you earn the Dog Scout Title on your dog, you are entitled to work toward a wide variety of specialty Merit Badges. From the Dog Scout badges right through all the merit badges, you will find everything you need on the <u>Merit Badges</u> section of the webpage – requirements, badge forms, and training tips and guides.

Some badges require that you keep a log, some are done on the "honor" system, and most can be earned by video submission if there is not a qualified Evaluator near you. Most of all... you and your dog will have tons of FUN learning and earning!

Badges are sorted by category to make them easier to locate. There are a few badges that "fit" more than one category, and you may see one listed in various places. It is the same badge – just included in multiple categories.

Please remember... although you MAY work on criteria for any badges you wish at any time, you will NOT be able to actually receive official recognition for those badges until after you have successfully earned the Dog Scout Title on your dog.

Oh Poop! Clean Up America 2

Part of the Dog Scouts of America vision is for dogs to be a welcome part of the community, however one of the biggest obstacles to this is unscooped dog poop! To lead by example and to go above and beyond as responsible dog-owning citizens, we'd like to encourage all members to work on the Clean Up America 2. community service merit badge this year. What's required?

Dog and handler, have found, picked up and properly disposed of at least 50 separate piles of dog excrement left behind by irresponsible dog owners in public places. The dog helped by finding the piles, packing out bagged piles in his or her backpack, and/or pulling a collection cart or wagon.

A pile can only count if:

- It was abandoned by the owner.
- It was left in an area where no one else would clean it up (such as a doggie waste clean up service.)
- It was found in a public place (your own yard or friend's yard doesn't count.)
- It was dog poop, not a pile left by geese, covote or any other wild animal.



Be sure to take photos of bagged waste as your proof and e-mail them along with the log sheet, form and a copy of the online badge payment e-mailed receipt to dsavideoeval@gmail.com.

Worried about the additional plastic waste going into the landfill? Check out biodegradable poop bags!

aPaws International Pooper Scooper Week April 1-7

The Association of Professional Animal Waste Specialists (aPaws), has established the first 7 days of April as a time to educate dog owners on the importance of scooping the poop—both in their own yards and certainly in public places. This would be a great week to schedule a troop community service activity by hitting those dog-frequented public locations and picking up piles! Or perhaps make April 7th the deadline to reach your +50-pile goal and submit your paperwork.

If you've already earned the Clean Up America 2 badge, check out the requirements for the Community Service badges and/or take the lead on your troop's Clean Up America activity.

You might also check with your local government stormwater management department to see if they have a Clean Water or Scoop the Poop program your troop can promote (it's also an opportunity to get the word out to local residents about your troop) or even a free pet waste station installation program such as the one in James City County, VA.

Doa Waste and Your Health

The American Pet Association estimates that this country's seventy-one million pet dogs produce over 4.4 billion pounds of waste per year. That's enough to cover 900 football fields with 12 inches of dog waste!

Dog feces are more than just a nuisance – pet waste can pose a serious health hazard. Why?.... A number of common parasites, including round worm, are transmitted via dog feces. When infected dog droppings are left on the ground the eggs of the roundworms and other parasites can linger in the soil for years. As a result, anyone who comes in contact with the soil also comes in contact with the infected eggs.

Children run the greatest risk of infection because they're prone to play in the dirt at the park or playground and then put their hands in their mouths or rub their eyes with their hands. But even a group of teens or adults playing Frisbee or touch football in an open area could be in danger. Parasitic infections can make humans extremely sick, and for pregnant women - can pose a serious harm to their unborn child.

How much do you know about picking up your No. 1 furry friend's No. 2? See if you can spot the facts from the fiction.

1. My dog's poops are actually good for the environment because they're a natural fertilizer. I think I'll leave them right where they are, thank you very much.

FALSE. Besides being a nuisance to see and smell (do you really want doggie land mines decorating your yard?), dog waste can pose a health risk if left on the ground. Contrary to what some people might think, dog waste is not a type of fertilizer, and is actually considered by the Environmental Protection Agency to be a "nonpoint source pollutant," placing it in the same category as herbicides, insecticides and toxic chemicals.

Dog feces can carry a host of disease and worms — including heartworms, whipworms, hookworms, roundworms, tapeworms, parvovirus, giardia, salmonella, and even E. coli. In order for feces from a carnivorous animal to be used as an effective fertilizer, it has to be fully composted with other materials such as egg shells and grass clippings and allowed to break down over time.

Every dog poops. And every day, pet parents go through the task of cleaning up and disposing of feces. But do you know how to dispose of dog poop properly? Whether you scoop it with a shovel or pick it up with a poop bag, there are a few things that pet parents need to know about the daily ritual. This is why it's imperative to clean it up after Fido does his duty.

2. If I leave the poop on the ground long enough, eventually the rain will wash it away/it will disintegrate, and it won't be a problem anymore. Out of sight, out of mind, right?

FALSE. When it rains, dog waste left on the ground washes into storm drains and can contribute harmful bacteria to our waterways, including local lakes, streams and beaches. According to www.doodycalls.com, two or three days' worth of droppings from a population of about 100 dogs can contribute enough bacteria to temporarily close a bay and all watershed areas within 20 miles to swimming and shell fishing.

3. You can flush dog poop down the toilet.

TRUE. In fact, flushing your dog's poop down the toilet is one of the best ways to dispose of it, according to the Natural Resources Defense Council. If your home is connected to the municipal sewage system, the poop will be sent to a wastewater treatment plant and eliminated of bacteria during the sanitation process.

Flushing dog poop down the toilet – *without a bag, only the waste* – is perhaps the best disposal method, says the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency and the National Resources Defense Council. Leaving pet waste on the ground increases public health risks by allowing harmful bacteria and nutrients to wash into storm drains, and eventually into local waterbodies.

But *cat feces should never be flushed*, as it may contain Toxoplasma gondii, a parasite that can infect people and animals. Municipal water treatment systems do not always kill this parasite.

4. You can flush bagged dog poop down the toilet.

FALSE. Unless you're itching to make an appointment with a plumber, do not flush dog poop that has been placed in a bag down your toilet. Doing so can clog your plumbing and mess up sewer systems. [Click here for further information about bags that claim to be biodegradable, compostable and/or flushable (Editor)]

5. Dog waste can be harmful to your health.

TRUE. Dog doo-doo can carry a crap-load (excuse the pun) of creepy crawlies, including heartworms, hookworms, roundworms and tapeworms. It can also contain diseases galore, including parvovirus, giardia, salmonella and E. coli. Ew! You don't want those disease-bombs sitting around your home or public walkways, so pick up after your dog, and be sure to wash your hands after doing so, or as soon as you can.

6. So what's the worst that can happen if I don't clean up my dog's poop? It's not like I can get a ticket or something.

FALSE. In some cities and counties, failure to clean up dog poop in public areas is a public offense, and can come with citations and fines.

Long story short: Scoop up that poop! Your neighbors (and the environment) will than



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


















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Thank you for participating in the 5th Annual Sparky's Turkey Trot.








Troop 149—MO ~ River City Rovers

On the 5th, we worked on agility, focusing on the handling for the 4-leaf Clover and Reverse Flow with Circle courses from the Agility Partners badge. The great thing about this badge is that dogs at all levels can start working on the courses.





For example, while novice handlers may not be stationary in the middle of the clover, they are still teaching the shoulder pull, rear and/or blind crosses. On the Reverse Flow course, we added a table before the first jump to give our dogs a more definite starting and finishing point. Both of the courses provided more advanced handlers the opportunity to see where their cues were late, which caused the dog to spin before or after an obstacle or swing wide in search of the next obstacle or get distracted by another dog. We also had access to a second agility field and participants were encouraged to work on a straight line/distance challenge.








Also coming up on April 11th is our Pet Easter Eggstravaganza! (formerly the Pet Easter Bonnet Contest and Parade) in Mystic Village.


