

Scout Scoop & Troop Tales

Troop 101—MI Adopting Molly

One of the newest members of my dog scout troop 101 is Molly, a Labrador Retriever whose pet parent is Kaylene Long. Molly's story is a very interesting one with a happy ending. Here's how it all began...





One of our troop members was Lorrie Reid (Troop leader, Fay Reid's Mom). Her Dog Scout, Autumn passed away about 1 year ago. Because of Lorrie's advancing age, she wanted to get a Golden that could act as a service dog for her around the house, bracing to help her get up from her gardening, and retrieving her gloves or dropped objects the way Autumn used to do. Daughter, Fay, started helping her look for another Golden Retriever.

As it happened, a friend knew of a Black Lab, that was a "career change dog" from a service dog organization. This pup was donated to the organization at 10 months, but wasn't going to be able to complete training, due to severe fear issues regarding men. Lord knows what happened to this poor puppy in her first family to make her go into alarm mode whenever a man approached...

Fay and Lorrie went to see Molly, who seemed to be drawn to Lorrie, and lay down at her feet. Fay knew it would be a challenge to get this dog comfortable in her own skin near men, but there was an instant connection between Lorrie and Molly. When they were approved to adopt her, Fay's sister Kaylene, went with Lorrie to pick up Molly. Kaylene was instantly smitten by this sweet Black Lab. When she lifted Molly into the truck, there was a look on her face that said, "I'm unsure of where I'm going, but I hope it's to a good place." She saw the softer side of Molly. There was none of this fear and aggression they had warned her about. At the age of 15 months, Molly came home to live with Lorrie.

Shortly afterwards, however, Lorrie had a mild heart attack and had to spend some time in the hospital. Then, in July, she fell and experienced a brain bleed. She was in and out of hospitals and back home with visiting nurses and Physical Therapists. After the brain bleed, the cat, Butterfly, didn't go to visit Lorrie in her room any more. But Molly was always there, putting a paw up on Lorrie's bed, and comforting her.

When Lorrie was not at home, Molly went to stay with Kaylene. Molly did not like Kaylene's husband, Scott. Molly had obviously come to know abuse from a man. But in a short period, she was sleeping in the bed between the two of them, cuddling. It was mostly standing or approaching men that triggered her fear.

Fay wanted to get Molly involved with Dog Scouts, to give her mom a reason to live. The girls would ask their mom which badges she wanted to work on next with Molly. Lorrie had always been very supportive of Dog Scouts, and enjoyed training and showing off all of the things that her two previous dogs, Maple DSA and Autumn DSA had learned. Kaylene and Molly created a painting and showed it to Lorrie. She had them frame it and put it in her room. She would tell all the visiting nurses about the painting, and how her dog, Molly had made it. When Lorrie became completely bedridden, she got a bell, and taught Molly to come to see what she wanted when she rang the bell. She loved showing this off to all visitors.

Two months before Lorrie passed away at age 84, she wrote down her wishes for the welfare of her animals after she dies. Butterfly, the cat was to go to son, Kevin, and Molly was to go to Kaylene, with the stipulation that Molly must continue with Dog Scouts, and have a nice walk each day. Lorrie loved her dog so much that she wanted the best life possible for Molly. She included money to support Molly's continued participation in DSA activities. All badges, equipment, enrollments, etc. were to be paid from the Molly fund.

Lorrie also willed Kaylene her "My Dog Scout and I can earn 30 merit badges before breakfast—What

can YOU do?" tee shirt. But she said that Kaylene couldn't wear it until she and Molly earned 30 merit badges together.

After Kaylene became the caretaker of Molly is when I first met them, in the summer of 2020. I found out that Kaylene is 10 years younger than Fay, and that they had a very good relationship. Kaylene says that growing up, Fay was like her second "mom," but FUN! They used to do all kinds of fun things with the dogs, like Fun Walks to benefit shelters, and holding garage sales to benefit Dog Scouts or other charities. But when Kaylene got married and moved away, they didn't see each other as often. It was a different chapter in Kaylene's life, and she became the step-mom to 4 kids and was running a farm, and dogs were well-loved pets and household companions. In the beginning, Scott was not even fond of having them in the house, much less the bed!

The sisters stayed true to their promise to provide a good Dog Scout life for Molly. Fay got them involved with scent work, as she thought it would be good for Molly. Then came agility, letterboxing and geocaching. Fay said that the best thing about DSA is that it "opens doors" to other activities,

and now, Molly is heading into competition in scent work and agility trials. Kaylene was really bitten by the "badge bug" and started doing all kinds of things with Molly to earn badges. Through the summer DSA was running the badge earning contest, and guess who won? Kaylene came in first place nationwide and won her very own "30 merit badges before breakfast" shirt.

It was such a fun summer. I was able to join with Kaylene and Fay and other DSA members on many of their canoe and kayaking river trips, and watch Molly learn more and more things and get comfortable with strangers. She has learned to calm herself when she starts to feel overwhelmed or panicky. We even passed within a few feet of a man fishing in the middle of the river, and she never let out a woof!

Kaylene says that she never realized how much she missed doing fun doggie stuff with Fay, until they got back involved with those things again. She says that Dog Scouts has opened her up to things she never even thought about doing with her dog. And her other dog, Jax (an English Setter) is getting a side benefit to all of this. He is now learning all kinds of fun things. Kaylene says that she underestimated him. She tended to think that Jax wouldn't do something or wouldn't like this or that activity, but then he surprises her. He has been earning badges right alongside Molly.

It warms my heart to think that a dying friend's wishes brought two sisters together, and helped two dogs "be all they can be" through DSA activities.

At a recent troop 217 virtual holiday party (to which Troop 101 members were invited), Troop leader Sally Hoyle asked us to think about something positive that transpired in our lives during the past year, and share it with the zoom meeting group. Fay and Kaylene each wanted to go first, because they both had the same thing to say, and, like true sisters, wanted to be the first to verbalize it. They had some of us in tears, as they spoke about how the adoption of Molly has brought two sisters together to enjoy so many things through Dog Scouts of America, and allowed a dog with baggage to find a loving home. Fay and Kaylene have become besties, and have rekindled their love for each other. Maybe this was Lorrie's plan all along...

With 2020 being The Year of COVID, many of our troop activities were limited or postponed. One, however, that did not change (other than added sanitizers and safety precautions), was our annual Meals On Wheels for Pets Project! We really worried that donations would be down this year but it ended up being our biggest year yet!! We put together 170 doggie gift bags (up more than 20% from last year!) and troop member, Nita Lanter, and her family made 80 kitty bags! Several of us did a lot of pre-work of sorting items and decorating bags ahead of time not knowing for sure how much help we'd have on baggin' day but it all worked out! There were so many bags of dog food donated, that there was no way the MOW folks could take all the food and the gift bags at once - even in their new, extra-large van that was purchased just for the client services program. We got the gift bags all loaded up on baggin' day Sunday and met back up with the MOW folks at the gym on Monday morning to load all the food. We ended up with some extra muscle compliments of FWFD. which made the process go a lot quicker!! The dog food was stacked on pallets back at the MOW warehouse and it amounted to 5 full pallets and a partial pallet. I think they are all still shocked at the overwhelming response to this year's project.

I got this message in an email from the Client Assistance Manager for MOW: "We are so happy for the clients and their furry friends who will be blessed with these items. It was a huge blessing, especially since our pet food donations have been down. I had to purchase food several months in a row because there were no donations coming in. Please let the group know that we received calls from concerned clients this year. They were worried that COVID would impact the holiday program. Many of them expressed that they didn't care if they got something for the holidays, but they were hoping that their pet would. These gift bags will surely make their holiday special."

We ended up with over 1,100 dog toys, 200 bowls; 1,000 chews; 200+ lbs biscuits; 200+ individually packaged treats; 300+ rolls poop bags; over 3,500 lbs of dog food; miscellaneous collars, leashes & brushes PLUS toys, treats, bowls and food for 80 cats! A huge thank you to our awesome troop, as well as their friends, family & coworkers for making this project such a huge success!

individually. She created a Selfie Holiday Scavenger Hunt. We had a list of 56 holiday items to find and have our dog do "selfies" with the holiday items.



At Christmas time we asked our members to post holiday pictures and greetings on our Troop Face Book page and this is a holiday greeting from Gnocchi.







We also brainstormed ways to use our therapy dogs and engage with those facilities that they regularly engaged with in the past. We decided to create baseball style cards for all of our dogs. We can use these to send electronically with the different facilities, and we can also have them printed to use once we can get back to doing therapy work and community events. We're going to share our cards on our Facebook page too. Our very talented Martha Thierry created a template for the cards and we provided her with a photo and information to plug in. We think they came out great!





Another way we plan to interact with one another is by playing games over Zoom. After the success of our holiday party we have realized that the possibilities are endless. We'll be playing a dog trivia game styled after Family Feud and doing a tricks challenge very soon.

I am so very thankful for Dog Scouts and my amazing troop members! We have been unable to get together in person for many months now since we have so many high risk members. Here in Michigan as in other places this pandemic and the isolation it has brought is really wearing on everyone. Still, we have been able to get together quite often for badge work or simply to talk, share training ideas, or just have fun. I'm really proud of everything my troop members accomplished in 2020 and look forward to what we will do together in 2021, whether virtually or face-to-face.
