We have new Dog Scouts to add to the class of 2022 from the past few months. Please join me in congratulating these dogs and their handlers for this accomplishment.



Goldy on GeoScenting and Canine Cognition

HI! It's Goldy from troop 101. I haven't written in awhile, but I could not let another month go by without giving a SHOUT OUT to the creators of the new badges GeoScenting and Canine Cognition. Thanks for giving us another reason to be out in the woods and sniffing! A huge thanks for giving us another way for our parents to understand our way of communicating to them.

The hard thing about the GeoScenting badge for our parents is using and understanding the GPS. As you can see from the photo on the right, humans can get confused when trying to use their GPS. It doesn't always take you to the exact spot of the cache depending on the satellites.





This means they really need our help and noses in finding these caches in the woods. If they would only listen and let us take the wheel we would find so many more....

One of my favorite things aside from swimming and going for hikes is using my nose.



This new GeoScenting badge combines my love of nature and using my nose to find these boxes in the woods that my mom goes crazy excited for.

So, if you like to hike and want to make your mom or dad happy, find out about this boxed clove smell and start tracking it down. You will have one happy parent and you get extra yummy treats for finding them.



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Troop 101—MI (cont.)

Now lets talk about this Canine Cognition badge. I've been trying to communicate to my mom for years to let her know things that "I know" and she is finally getting it with the help of this badge. Things like, "You know the pool is empty, right?" "You know it's time to eat."

She is not assuming anymore but letting me make more choices; which treats I want today, which direction to take on walks, do I want to go to my dads house or not, and more.

Mom has found out that we dogs see the color blue and yellow better than other colors. So, we have been working on distinguishing between the two colors and different shapes. We play the shape game with my Kong shapes or the cut out ones. I like the Kong ones better—they sometimes have treats in them.



I've always been very helpful around the house but now she trusts me to get the right shoe or sock when she shows me the "matching one" she has.

I have additional duties now helping mom with the finances by "counting" what we have left so we don't over buy.



The Leave it portion of this badge goes beyond the normal walk by stuff we've been subjected to.





This time they are playing the "I know you know" game by covering their eyes, turning their backs and believe it or not, leaving the room for a minute. This can be a challenge especially if its something really good. My suggestion is to have your parent take it slow, start with low value stuff and get some distance and duration and time. Only work on one of those at a time. Give really high

value rewards. My mom never lets me have what she has told me to leave. She says its because you never know when it could be something really dangerous like a pill. So instead of me trying to second guess her whether she's going to let me have, I know I will never get that one, but she always gives me something else. The only exception she makes is the "leave it" game on my paws. Those I always get when she says or signs "EAT IT". This game she puts a treat on each of my paws and makes me wait for the cue "EAT IT".

I would recommend that you get your parents interested in these two badges. Mom and I have been having a lot of fun with them. Goldy signing off for now. Time to play with Mom.

Several of us participated in clean up activities at camp in the months preceding Dog Scout Camp. We cleaned up trails, cut down trees, burned brush and created a new activity area on camp property. We have all learned new skills with these activities, and we have found ourselves capable of adapting when things don't quite go as planned. In the photo you can see that the tree that was being cut down didn't fall outward as planned, but as it started to go the wrong way we quickly changed our approach and had the tree fall in the relatively small space between the craft building and the other trees, all while keeping everyone safe. We always do a lot of work when we get together for clean up but also find plenty of time to hike and play with our dogs.



All those hours spent doing clean up really pay off when it comes time for camp in June and July. Many troop members attended camp where we worked on our two new badges, GeoScenting and Canine Cognition, as well as other badges that are a part of our core. We did a lot of scent work at camp, offering both Scent Discrimination and Advanced Scent Discrimination. It was fun to see so many dogs be successful with these! We also offered Copy Cat as a prerequisite to Canine Cognition and lots of dogs had fun learning in new ways using fast-mapping.

A number of us participated in a Barn Hunt clinic where the instructor had a special session just for Dog Scouts. This provided us with an opportunity to earn the Barn Hunt badge while learning in a comfortable environment with people that we knew well. Not all of our dogs had the same level of experience with Barn Hunt, with some dogs having no experience and others often participating in Barn Hunt trials. Still, the instructor was so patient in working with us that most of our dogs were able to earn the badge. Even those dogs that didn't learned quite a bit and will be successful at our next opportunity. It was really quite a fun day!






Other than our big activities we have continued to hike, letterbox and geocache, including Doing some GeoScenting. Many of us are hooked on this new twist to geocaching and are actively working to get geoscented caches out in the wild so that others are able to do it too. 






Learning is What we Do! And sharing our knowledge is Great!



Because of his participation in the Morris Study, Dayton was awarded a Hero Ribbon at the 2019 GRCA National Specialty and was honored in the Hero Parade.






