#### Periodic Test!

From time to time, I like to give the dogs their periodic quiz. This means that I take one dog alone into a different location (one where we don't usually train), and quiz the dog on the behaviors that I have printed out on a "report card." This morning I used my bedroom, and more specifically, the bed (for all but the walking or positioning in relation to my body cues).

The quiz is to measure the dog's stimulus control and fluency with verbal cues (or the LACK thereof). I give scores of 1 to 5 in response to cues given in a normal tone of voice, while remaining perfectly still and avoiding body or eye cues. I remain still and wait for a response. If they perform the desired behavior on the first cue, they get a 5. If they're slow, it might be a 5- (five minus). Sometimes it takes a repeat of the cue before they resign themselves to the fact that I do indeed expect them to do this in a strange location. If it takes more than a few cues/prompts to jolt their memory, I assess that they do NOT have an understanding of the cue. Or at least not in the context of this new environment. It means I have to do a better job at training in different locations!

The rules for Stimulus control are:

- 1. Dog responds correctly each time you cue the behavior.
- 2. Dog does NOT offer the behavior without the cue.
- 3.Dog doesn't offer that behavior in response to a different cue.
- 4. Dog does not offer a different response to the cue you gave.

I say it is a quiz for the dog, but what I'm really testing is the job I've done as their trainer. I can't blame the dog for insufficient training! Every now and then, we should all test the skills that we THINK we have taught our dogs, to see if we did a good job or not. We may have taught them to be totally dependent on body language or context.

I used to challenge my obedience students to set their dog up for a regulation Retrieve on the Flat, tell the dog to stay, then, while facing forward, throw the dumbbell backwards (over your shoulder), cue "Fetch," and see what your dog does. Does he THINK it through, or does he automatically run out 20 feet in front of you, expecting to find the dumbbell there?

If your dog is lying down, try cueing him to lie down, and see if he assumes you meant something else, because he's already lying down.

I suggest you try the quiz. It will open your eyes to how well you have done at training your dog. Have fun! And Post Pictures on our <u>All Troop Training Group</u> on Facebook.






Canine athletes and their loyal trainers competed in five Olympic sports: Gymnastics, Basketball, Weightlifting, Equestrian and Cycling.

They especially seemed to enjoy seeing their humans do behaviors, too!






We are looking forward to the hot Texas temps cooling down soon and spending more time with our dogs in the great outdoors!

Member Michelle even found herself on stage speaking to the crowd!





#### Troop 188—CT (cont.)








We held a number of training outings in both urban and park settings, where we practiced the skills to become a Dog Scout.

#### About First Step ARK -

First Step is a non-profit agency in Wayne County Michigan providing comprehensive services for victims of domestic and sexual violence.

The ARK (Animals Receiving Kindness) Building allows survivors to bring their pets into shelter. The building features four dog kennels, four cat kennels, an outdoor dog run, four outdoor dog pens, a cat play area, a family visitation area, a laundry/storage area and a restroom.

The ARK is an important resource to remove the barriers that keep survivors from leaving for fear that their pet will be harmed or killed as a result of the power and control that often occurs in domestic violence situations.

The shelter does not have a lot of space to store things, so monetary donations are the best way to help. They will purchase things as needed for the animals staying in the shelter. If you would like to make a donation to ARK go to

This badge is so important to teach since it can really help you to connect with your dog if he loses his hearing in the future. We have a longtime member who relied on sign language alone to communicate with her dog for nearly 6 years after the dog lost her hearing. Because of this experience, we revisit this topic every couple of years. At this time we have only begun to check out requirements for a few dogs but anticipate that many will complete the requirements and earn the badge this fall.

Troop members Cheryl with Matty and Carrie with Darby have been focusing on therapy visits in the past few months. While Darby is a seasoned therapy dog with many, many hours under her belt, Matty is new to therapy work. Matty just earned his credentials for therapy work this spring and has been spending his time practicing his skills in many different venues. As Matty becomes more skilled he will surely find his niche in therapy work, just as Darby has.

In addition to other accomplishments, dogs in our troop—including Jaxson and my own Mackenzie and Bruno—have earned 9 Trails titles this year.

## Rainbow Bridge

Luie crossed the rainbow bridge on June 5, 2024. Not only did Luie earn titles, but he was a service dog for 8 years, helping me with my disability to function better. Then, in his retirement, he continued to serve as a therapy dog. He was a wonderful dog who loved life, food, fetch, bum scratches, and swimming (not necessarily in that order). He remained a cadet only because of my procrastination - he could have passed the test with a breeze.

I remember when I took Luie swimming for the first time. My previous dog only liked to wade in the water, so I did a double take when he took off into the water and swam out to the middle of the pond! He swam



instinctively, and he loved swimming - as a former lifeguard and competitive swimmer; I was thrilled! I introduced him to dock diving and while he didn't think jumping off the dock was as fun as swimming (he never advanced past novice); he LOVED to swim for his toy! A local family had a dock and pool for dogs and we'd rent it. There were many memories made there swimming together, racing for his toy, jumping off together, and more.

While Luie displayed ecstatic exuberance in the water, he remained calm and collected during visits or outings to nursing homes and hospitals as a therapy dog. He brought joy to many faces with his smile and gentle attitude. His favorite was always being invited to activity time in the nursing homes when the residents would throw a soft toy and he would return it to the resident of his choice by gently placing it in their lap then back off to wait for them to throw it again. Somehow he seemed to always know who hadn't had a turn or who might need a little more time to pick up the toy and toss it or who needed a little "encouragement" (aka a little woof!). But he was always up for some calm pets, too. We heard many stories of farm dogs, long gone, brought back to memory by petting Luie's short coat.

Luie was cool and chill in times of trouble, too. When I would pass out, he knew to follow his training and immediately lick my face and arms until I regained consciousness and let him know I was okay. If at home, he retrieved a bottle of water for me (sometimes a random other object or two - like a book, pillow, stuffed animal, or dog toy - just in case, of course!). He knew several other tasks as well, such as counterbalance to help me walk. He was always reliable in public, no matter what weird thing we encountered - like a life-sized animatronic dinosaur, costumed people, or just a loud scary movie. His one weakness was food - food on the ground sometimes ended with him giving me "puppy dog eyes" asking if just this once he could have it. Pretty please?

Luie was a very good boy who touched many who will miss his smiling face, his happy tongue, and "love of life" attitude.
