That's right! DSA's newest badge is Fast CAT! Many members have asked about Fast CAT and we decided the time was right to implement our own badge.

If you're not familiar with Fast CAT, it's basically a 100-yard dash following a lure. It's a very popular activity with dog clubs around the country.

All of the badge information for Fast CAT is now available on the DSA website and we know that many of you will be wanting to send in videos for this badge soon; however, we ask that you **hold off on sending any videos for evaluation until after January 20.**



As with any badge, you'll need to review the badge requirements and criteria carefully. In writing this badge we wanted to ensure that both handler and dog engaged in the activity, therefore, in addition to the dog running the course successfully twice, the handler must demonstrate management of their dog appropriately on and around the course, assist in the operations of the activity, and calculate their own dog's MPH.




As the CAT in Fast CAT means "Coursing Ability Test," the dog must **stay on the lure** in order for the run to be successful. That means that no one may call the dog to the end or yell any encouragement. While a "Go! Go! Go!" is permitted in the starting area as a help to get the dog ready to run, the handler (or helper) must stop talking once the dog crosses the start line.



We were able to preview this badge at the Badge Blitz event at the MI Camp in November. The participating dogs all had a lot of fun with it as did the people, despite the cold and wind.

We hope that you and your dogs will have fun with it too and we look forward to seeing your videos.



First Aid Skills Are Important!

How are your First Aid skills? Are you confident that you can handle an emergency that comes up suddenly with your or someone else's dog?

Even though we have a First Aid badge that you may have earned with your dog, education on this topic must continue. Familiarity and practice will help to keep you calm when an accident happens or another emergency occurs.

My first aid skills were recently put to the test when I received a call from my next door neighbor. He asked if I was free to come and help him with his dog's toenail. He didn't sound concerned on the phone, so I headed over to help, assuming that he needed help clipping toenails. I should have asked more questions.



I entered his house and immediately realized that I was walking into a true emergency. There were pools of blood all over the floor in his kitchen and den and Indy, one of his dogs was on the floor on his side and a bit frantic. Looking at my neighbor, I realized that he understood that his dog was in trouble. He simply asked, "Can you hold him?"

Now Indy is a sweet dog, very calm and docile, but he is 180 pounds, much bigger and stronger than I am. As you can see from the photo, Indy is an Irish Wolfhound. Had he been a smaller dog, he would not have survived the amount of blood loss that was indicated by the many huge pools on the floor and now soaking the carpet in the den.

I assessed the situation carefully and saw that the blood was coming from Indy's foot, but there was too much blood to see what was wrong. I quickly grabbed a leash and put an emergency muzzle on the dog, a good idea in an emergency situation and necessary here due to Indy's size and how close I knew I had to get to his rather large head and teeth to even attempt to slow the blood loss.

After muzzling Indy I was comfortable to restrain him. As it seemed that my neighbor was in a panic, I restrained the dog by putting my body on top of his and immobilized his leg with my right hand. That left my left hand free to probe his foot. After applying pressure for a few minutes I was able to see that Indy's toenail was completely gone, leaving a large hole in his foot that was spurting blood.

Once I knew what I was dealing with it was just a matter of slowing the bleeding and applying a pressure dressing. Simple, but I had little in the way of supplies. That's where asking questions in advance would have helped. I grabbed a kitchen towel that looked clean and wrapped Indy's foot up tightly. I asked my neighbor to hold the towel tightly while I ran back to my house for our first aid kit.

First Aid Skills Are Important! (Continued)

Upon returning next door I unwrapped Indy's foot to discover that the pressure had helped considerably. I grabbed the scissors from my first aid kit and clipped as much hair as possible from around the toe. Then I was able to pack the wound and apply a proper pressure dressing. I wrapped the foot up tightly so that Indy couldn't disturb my handiwork.

With the situation now under control I removed the muzzle, escorted Indy to the sofa and gave him some Benadryl to keep him calm. Then I sat my neighbor down beside him and gave him a shot of whiskey to steady his nerves. I advised that Indy be taken to the vet in the morning and told my neighbor to call me if Indy bled through the pressure dressing before he could get to the vet.

Indy got to the vet the following morning. She assessed my work and determined that there was no sign of infection and that the wound was packed well. She didn't want to chance disturbing the wound by removing all the packing. She rewrapped the foot and sent them home with instructions to leave the bandage on and limit Indy's activity for 3 days.

Indy's foot has since healed and he is back to normal. My neighbor has no idea how Indy lost his toenail so dramatically and says that cleaning up all that blood the next day was no picnic.

Indy is such a sweet boy and I'm glad that I could help him, but had I not been well versed in first aid, the situation could have had a much different outcome. This was not a simple nick of the quick that quick stop could help. It was the removal of the entire nail.

We have quite a bit of information on first aid on our website with the <u>badge information</u>. Reviewing this information periodically will help you to be confident and prepared in emergency situations. There are also canine first aid classes held by different organizations around the country. A quick internet search will let you know if there are any coming up in your area.

Keep your skills fresh! You never know when an emergency will cause you to need those skills. Being prepared could help you to save a life.


